## Meet the Speakers ...

### Professor Richard Hobbs



As well as being Professor and Head of the Nuffield Department of Primary Care Health Sciences at the University of Oxford, he is also the National Director of the NIHR School for Primary Care Research (2009-) and Director, NIHR Collaboration for Leadership in Applied Health Research and Care (NIHR CLAHRC) Oxford. He was Co-Director of the Quality and Outcomes (QOF) Review Panel from 2005-09. He sits on many national and international scientific and research funding boards, including the Council of the British Heart Foundation (until 2012), and is President of the European Primary Care Cardiovascular Society (EPCCS).

His research interests focus on cardiovascular epidemiology and clinical trials, especially relating to vascular and stroke risk, and Heart Failure. Overall his publications include 28 book chapters, 13 edited books and over 350 original papers in peer reviewed journals such as the Lancet, Annals of Internal Medicine, BMJ, Atherosclerosis, EHJ and Stroke. His research has impacted on international health policies and clinical guidelines. Within the NHS, he has consulted on National Service Frameworks for CHD, Atrial Fibrillation, and Heart Failure and several National Institute of Clinical Excellence (NICE) reviews. Professor Hobbs has also provided clinical care in inner-city general practice for over 35 years.

### Dr Yassir Javaid

Primary Care Cardiovascular lead, East Midlands Strategic Clinical Network

Dr Javaid qualified from Cambridge University and completed his GP VTS training in Northampton.

He has an interest in cardiology and echocardiography and was a clinical lead in the Northamptonshire Community Cardiology service, which had a focus on patients with heart failure and valve disease.

He was recently named Pulse “GP of the Year” for his work in reducing stroke emergency admissions in the East Midlands.

He is also a council member of the British Heart Valve Society and on the editorial board for the British Journal of Cardiology.
